A Year in Review

In the past few years, law enforcement has faced unprecedented challenges, which have included the COVID-19 pandemic, calls for defunding the police, political polarization, increased mental health issues, and changing crime patterns. Moving into the year 2021 did not eliminate any of these issues, but we continued to address them positively this past year.

The Woodridge Police Department continues to listen, collaborate, and adapt to every challenge. We have continued to modify policies, training, and procedures to meet community expectations. We understand building community partnerships makes for a safe community. Because of our community partnerships, the Woodridge Police Department launched several new police programs, which include:

- · An improved training program focused on de-escalation and officer wellness. The training program's goal is to provide officers with a variety of tools to handle difficult situations with the primary focus on safety and preservation of life.
- · Adding a social worker to the police department staff. Our social worker assisted with outreach to those impacted by the tornado, domestic violence victims, senior issues, crime victims, and especially mental health issues.
- · The first year of our Body-Worn Camera Program (BWC). The BWC program has increased department transparency, improved evidence collection, assisted in documentation, and protected our officers.
- · Continue our facility improvement project; which has led to a spring 2022 groundbreaking for the new police department.

Our community partnerships have given us the ability to overcome many challenges – nothing more notable than on the night of June 20, 2021. On that night, we experienced a devastating tornado. Personally, the community response was a watershed moment in my police career. My heart was touched as I watched neighbors working side-by-side, with public safety throughout the night, weeks, and months that followed. The entire police department witnessed the outpouring of support, and it reaffirmed our dedication to the Woodridge community.








CSO Almaraz started at the Woodridge Police Department on March 16, 2021.



Officer Harvey was sworn in on December 9, 2021.





Organizational Chart




Crime Data - Part I & Part II

Part I Crimes

PART I CRIMES: The FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program divides offenses into two groups, Part I and Part II crimes. Part 1 crimes include the most severe crimes impacting society (i.e., homicides, thefts, and assaults.) In 2021, there were 324 Part I crimes committed in Woodridge. Part I crimes decreased by 45 percent in 2021 compared to a decade ago. Part I crimes continue to fall significantly compared to 1990 when the Part I crimes reached 1,043.





Part II Crimes

PART II CRIMES: Part II crimes include controlled substance violations, vehicle offenses, vandalism and are generally less serious than Part I crimes according to the FBI. Part II crimes in 2021 increased by nearly 8 percent compared to 2020.

Part II Crimes: 2011 - 2021




Crime Data - Catalytic Converter Thefts

A theft from a motor vehicle is when something is stolen from the *outside* of a vehicle (e.g., catalytic converter, hubcap). Theft from a Motor Vehicle is different from a burglary to a motor vehicle (BMV) because a BMV occurs when something is stolen from *inside* of the vehicle. Woodridge saw a sharp increase in thefts from motor vehicles from 10 in 2020 to 52 in 2021 mainly due to catalytic converter thefts.

To help prevent catalytic converter thefts, park in a garage or well-lit area, install a security camera, or etch the vehicle's VIN or license plate onto the converter. Some thieves can remove a catalytic converter in as little as three minutes using a cordless reciprocating saw. A thief may receive between \$50 - \$250 per converter according to the National Insurance Crime Bureau, and the replacement for a coverter could range from \$2,000 - \$2,500.


2021 Thefts from Motor Vehicles

The catalytic converter is located on the underside of a vehicle and looks like a large metal box. The thefts from motor vehicles increased in 2021, primarily due to catalytic converter thefts. The converters typically contain platinum, palladium, rhodium, and other precious metals that thieves can sell to metal dealers.

Community Outreach


The coronavirus pandemic continued to bring extraordinary challenges that derailed many of our traditional outreach events. The COVID metrics started to improve in the summer only for breakthrough COVID cases to occur, and the state of Illinois reinstated the mask mandates. Then the Omicron variant hit towards the winter 2021. Nevertheless, the Woodridge Police Department adapted to COVID by hosting various events and following public health guidelines.



School Resource Officer Jeff Bean created a scavenger hunt with prizes for the winners. The scavenger hunt featured strategically placed QR codes for clues throughout Woodridge.



Patrol

The Patrol Division is the largest component of the Woodridge Police Department. The Division responds to emergency and non-emergency calls for service. Officers routinely respond to calls for service about criminal offenses, traffic crashes, alarm activation, disturbances, traffic complaints and more. In addition to patrol functions, officers also train in specialties such as, juvenile law.





Records Unit


The Records Unit processes all police reports, traffic tickets, felony and misdemeanor charges, parking tickets, court notices, expungements, and subpoenas, as well as FOIA requests, and criminal history requests. In addition, the Records Unit is responsible for maintaining monthly crime data. Staff also assist residents with police-related questions.



Tactical Unit


The Tactical Unit targets narcotic investigations and gang activities. The Tactical Unit is responsible for the department's property seizures, including vehicles, cash, and other property due to illegal activities. They conduct regular alcohol and tobacco enforcement throughout the Village and assist other agencies such as the DuPage County Sheriff's Department, Illinois State Police, DEA, and other area municipal police departments.


Detective Unit





Traffic Unit

The primary goal of the Traffic Unit is to reduce the number of traffic collisions and encourage overall traffic safety in our village streets and neighborhoods through a combination of enforcement, public education, and engineering.



Woodridge Police Department Officer John Phelps was awarded second place (municipalities with 36-50 sworn officers) in the Illinois Traffic Safety Challenge. Officer Phelps completed the Traffic Safety Challenge for four years, and he successfully placed every year.



Community Services

The Community Services Unit focuses on non-emergency calls for services that include vehicle lock-outs, code enforcement, as well as animal control functions. Community Service Officers (CSOs) assist patrol officers by responding to many types of non-emergency calls. CSOs also assist with daily calls for service to allow sworn officers to focus on priority policing initiatives. They provide essential non-emergency assistance to the Police Department and Village Hall, and assist the Community Development Department with code enforcement.



Narcan Deployments

NARCAN is a needle-free spray that Woodridge officers carry to help counteract the life-threatening effects of an opioid overdose. According to the DuPage County Health Department, in 2020, DuPage County experienced an all-time high of 112 opioid-related overdose deaths.* Additionally, 194 opioid-overdose reversals were performed with the use of NARCAN by individuals participating in the <u>DuPage NARCAN Program</u>. The Woodridge Police Department had five NARCAN deployments and saved four lives in 2021.

Woodridge Tornado Commendations

On Sunday, June 20, 2022, at approximately 11:10 p.m., an EF-3 tornado touched down in the Village of Woodridge. The National Weather Service reported the tornado-packed winds of 140mph, and the total path ran for more than 16 miles – crossing I355 and I55 – and reaching a maximum width of 600 yards before dissipating. The Police Department received more than 200 calls for service. Many of the first calls to 911 involved life-threatening emergencies, downed power lines, gas leaks, and fires. There were 6,429 ComEd customers without power and 11 reported injuries. The Department put out an all-page request for every available officer to respond and activated the Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System (ILEAS) for mutual aid. For going above and beyond during the largest natural disaster in Woodridge history, these officers received the Commendation Award.
